Living Sustainably and Fighting Climate Change

Reduce - Reuse - Recycle

Avoid single use plastics It takes a single use plastic water bottle around 450 years to decompose in a landfill.

Refill empty containers at the Yard Market (near to the Pepperpot on Godalming High St) instead of buying new; refills are available for the whole range of household products - from laundry detergent to washing up liquid and from shampoo to liquid soap.

Avoid common mistakes with recycling Wash dirty containers and packaging before recycling; make sure items are dry (no soggy cardboard boxes/newspapers or greasy pizza boxes); used paper towels can't be recycled; most disposable coffee cups can't be recycled (as they have a plastic liner) and even those that are 'compostable' can't go in food and garden organics bins; however the plastic lids can be recycled.

Use the recycling checker tool here if you're not sure how to recycle an item.

Recycle soft plastics at supermarkets (Sainsburys, Co-op, Tesco etc have bins at the entrance). This includes all plastics which don't scrunch like foil and paper (ie if it bounces back after scrunching it's a soft plastic) for example: crisp packets, most packaging (remove labels where possible), sweet wrappers, bubble wrap.

Recycle used cosmetics and beauty products Most hard-to-recycle products eg mascara, make-up palettes, toothpaste tubes, lotion pumps, can be recycled at Boots on Godalming High St.

Recycle your glasses and contact lenses at Specsavers.

Use plant-based cleaning products A wide range of eco brands are available in supermarkets. Standard bleaches etc contain chemicals which contribute to the runoff in rivers/seas, which destroy natural ecosystems. You can also buy eco alternative kitchen cloths.

Avoid using chemical pesticides in your garden There are lots of alternative approaches as suggested by <u>Surrey Wildlife Trust</u>

Scrunch small bits of foil (for example milk bottle tops or foil from your Easter eggs) together into a large ball, as small bits slip through the conveyor belt.

Non-rechargeable batteries can be recycled in many shops and supermarkets, and the Witley recycling centre.

Use biodegradable packing tape to replace Sellotape and other adhesive tapes (which contain plastics). Try <u>Peace with the Wild</u> online shop.

Buy plastic free chewing gum - also available from the <u>Peace with the Wild online shop.</u>

Recycle your food waste in your green food waste caddy; it's recycled to

create bio-fertiliser and biogas, and used to generate electricity, heat and transport fuel.

Repair broken items to prevent waste and keep household items working for as long as possible. **The Repair Cafe** is at the Godalming Borough Hall every 4th Saturday from 10am to 12.30pm. Next open on 27 April. More info here.

Borrow items from Library of Things (LOT) run by a local environmental charity WhatNext in partnership with the Godalming Library. LOT now has about 50 items ready for lending.

Sell and buy books through WOB Lots of paperbacks end in landfill (including many donated to charity shops). <u>WOB</u> reduces waste and rehomes books and is affordable and sustainable.

Recycle your back copies of Bible Alive, Magnificat etc The Catholic charity Crown of Thorns redistributes religious literature and devotional objects. Send ££ contribution with your package to help with the costs of onward distribution to hospitals, prisons and churches in the UK and abroad.

Support our local foodbanks

If you have surplus fresh produce – fruit, veg, eggs, bread – you can leave it on the open shelves by the door at the <u>Godalming Community Store</u> in Farncombe (in the grounds of Farncombe Cricket Club, Summers Rd, GU7 3BE).

Donations are also needed of a wide range of food and household products and there are collection points at local supermarkets. The list of urgently needed items is <u>here</u> and includes items for children over the Easter break who would normally receive free school meals. And Easter eggs are also welcome! See also the list of needs from St Mark's foodbank

Final words from Pope Francis' Laudate Deum

69 I ask everyone to accompany this pilgrimage of reconciliation with the world that is our home and to help make it more beautiful, because that commitment has to do with our personal dignity and highest values. At the same time, I cannot deny that it is necessary to be honest and recognize that the most effective solutions will not come from individual efforts alone, but above all from major political decisions on the national and international level.

70 Nonetheless, every little bit helps, and avoiding an increase of a tenth of a degree in the global temperature would already suffice to alleviate some suffering for many people. Yet what is important is something less quantitative: the need to realize that there are no lasting changes without cultural changes, without a maturing of lifestyles and convictions within societies, and there are no cultural changes without personal changes.

71. Efforts by households to reduce pollution and waste, and to consume with prudence, are creating a new culture. The mere fact that personal, family and community habits are changing is contributing to greater concern about the unfulfilled responsibilities of the political sectors and indignation at the lack of interest shown by the powerful. Let us realize, then, that even though this does not immediately produce a notable effect from the quantitative standpoint, we are helping to bring about large processes of transformation rising from deep within society.
